

THE CADET CODE

- A CADET IS COURAGEOUS: He stands for what is right and just even when others appear to be against him. He protects the underdog, and defends the weak. He has the courage to say "No" when he is asked to do something wrong. He has the courage to speak out against evil. He knows that moral courage is more important than physical courage.
- A CADET IS RELIABLE: He is at the right place at the right time. He can be depended upon. He doesn't let the other members of his unit down.
- A CADET IS TRUSTWORTHY: He can be counted upon to do the right thing. He can be entrusted with important matters.
- A CADET IS WELL-INFORMED: He tries to increase his military knowledge continually. He learns what is going on in world affairs.
- A CADET IS JUST: He is fair in all his dealings with others. He is considerate of others and of their rights and feelings.
- A CADET IS LOYAL: He supports his fellow cadets. He is loyal to his unit.
- A CADET IS UNPREJUDICED: He does not judge a fellow cadet on the basis of religious belief, race or economic status. He judges his fellow cadets on the basis of demonstrated individual worth and ability.
- A CADET IS TOLERANT: He respects the beliefs and opinions of the other fellow when they differ from his own. He does not impose his point of view on others.
- A CADET IS HONORABLE: He does not make false statements about others. He tries to live up to the Golden rule: Do Unto Others as You Would Have Them Do Unto You.
- A CADET IS FRIENDLY: He acts in a cordial manner toward his fellow cadets. He is especially friendly towards new cadets in his unit.
- A CADET IS UNCONCEITED: He strives to success, to advance in rank, to acquire medals, and decorations, but his success does not go to his head. He remains modest and considerate of the feelings of others.
- A CADET IS NEAT: All cadets are not handsome, but all cadets can keep their uniforms cleaned and pressed, their shoes shined, their hair trimmed, and their hands and faces clean.
- A CADET IS CLEAN MINDED: It is not necessary for the cadet to swear and use obscenity in order that the world will think him a man. To talk without using profanity or obscenity is a real accomplishment and a sure mark of maturity.
- A CADET IS COURTEOUS: He exercises courtesy in his relations with others. He practices politeness at all times so that it becomes a natural habit.
- A CADET IS A GOOD SPORT: When he wins he doesn't brag, when he loses he doesn't complain. He always follows the rules of the game and abides by the decisions of the judges.
- A CADET IS PATRIOTIC: He does more than stand at attention and salute when the Flag passes by. He develops an understanding of what his Country and the democratic way of life really signify. He does not apologize for his patriotism.

CADET CODE CONTINUED

A CADET IS HEALTHY: He gets his body into the best shape he can and he does everything possible to keep in a state of health. He eats sensibly, and he avoids alcohol in all forms. He does not rush the matter of smoking, and, if he does take up smoking, he smokes in moderation.

A CADET IS HONEST: He does not take the property of others. He does not lie or cheat.

A CADET IS TACTFUL: He does not offend others unnecessarily. He does not say unkind things. He is considerate of others, of their rights, and of their feelings.

A CADET IS STUDIOUS: He takes advantage of his time in school to learn what he can while he is there. He knows that knowledge is power, and he absorbs all he is capable of learning in whatever field he is studying or working.

A CADET IS A GOOD CITIZEN: He takes an interest in his community. He does what he can to make his school and his community a better place in which to study and to live. Above all he does nothing to make his school or community a worse place.

This Cadet Code is a set of principles similar to those used at West Point Military Academy. If you follow these principles you will not only be a better Cadet but a better person as well.

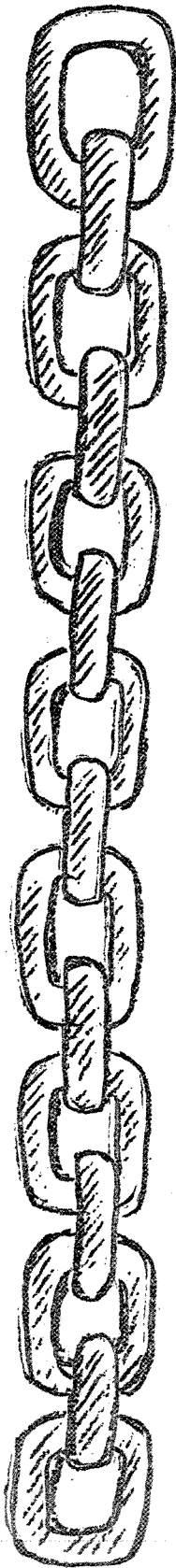

I. Promotional Requirements

A. CADET FIRST CLASS

B. Corporal

1. Same as for Cadet First Class.
2. Interior Guard.
3. Excellence in all phases of the school of the soldier.
4. PRI
5. Military organization platoon level.
6. Map reading (basic).
7. First Aid.
8. Recommendation of platoon leader and company commander.

C. Sergeant

1. Same for the above.
2. Ability to conduct squad drill.
3. Ability to act as a coach on the rifle range.
4. Ability to act as a commander of a relief for Interior Guard.
5. Military organization company level.
6. Recommendation of platoon leader and company commander.
7. Organizational vacancy must exist.

D. Sergeant First Class

1. Same as the above.
2. Ability to conduct platoon drill.
3. Ability to act as a sergeant of the guard.
4. Squad tactics.
5. A passing schoolastic standing in all subjects.
6. Recommendation of platoon leader and company commander.
7. Satisfactory completion of the Basic Leadership School
8. Ability to instruct in two or more basic subjects.

E. Master Sergeant

1. Ability to conduct Company drill.
2. Knowledge of company supply and administration.
3. Ability to instruct in all basic subjects.
4. Ability to act as a commander of the guard.
5. Approval of a board of two officers and one senior NCO.

D. SERGEANT FIRST CLASS

1. Same as for the above
2. Ability to conduct platoon drill
3. Ability to act as a sergeant of the guard
4. Squad tactics.
5. A passing scholastic standing in all classes
6. Satisfactory completion of basic leadership school
7. Ability to instruct in at least two basic subjects

E. MASTER SERGEANTS

1. Same as for the above
2. Ability to conduct company drill
3. Knowledge of company supply and administration
4. Ability to instruct in all basic subjects

(cont.)

6. Military organization battalion level.
7. At least a "C" schoolastic average.
8. Platoon tactics.
9. Recommend summer camp or its equivalent.

F. Officers Company Grade

1. Ability to instruct in all basic and intermediate subjects.
2. Ability to conduct all drill up to and including a battalion.
3. Platoon tactics.
4. Summer camp.
5. Basic leadership.
6. Approval of a board of two officers and one senior NCO.
7. Ability to conduct training and operations on personal initiative.
8. Ability to make timely and correct decisions.
9. Junior standing.
10. At least one year in the corps.
11. Recommend "B" schoolastic standing.
12. Personal honesty of the highest order.

II. ORDERS FOR PROMOTIONS

- A. Promotion to cadet first class may be made on a company order.
- B. Promotion of corporals and NCO's will be made on a battalion special order.
- C. Officers will be commissioned only on a order by the Military Department of the State of California.

III. REDUCTIONS

- A. Other than officers.
 1. Cadet first class may be reduced on a company order.
 2. NCO's and corporals may be reduced only on a battalion special order.
 3. The cadet concerned may if he desires, ask a board to be assembled consisting of two officers and one senior NCO to hear charges. If no board is requested the reduction will be officially listed as being made at the request of the cadet concerned.
 4. If the accused requests, the board will be open to the public.
- B. Officers may be relieved of their commands only on grave charges. If grounds exist a board of two officers and the Commandant of Cadets will hear the charges. If the board recommends that the officer resign the recommendation will be binding.

PROFICIENCY BADGE (BASIC)

1. Proficiency with basic bar is awarded annually by the California Cadet Corps to cadets who satisfactorily complete the prescribed requirements for this award.

2. To be eligible for this award a cadet must:

a. Demonstrate mastery of the following requirements:

(1) Dismounted Drill

- (a) Demonstrate ability to correctly execute movements of the school of the soldier without arms.
- (b) Demonstrate ability to correctly execute movements of the Manual of Arms for the rifle.
- (c) Demonstrate ability to correctly function as an individual cadet in squad and platoon drill movements.
- (d) Know the purposes of drill, and the definitions of drill terms.

(2) Interior Guard Duty

- (a) Explain the purpose of interior guard duty, the proper method of challenging, and the use of passwords.
- (b) Explain in detail the organization of the "Patrol System" and the "Fixed Post System" of interior guard duty.
- (c) Memorize the 11 general orders and be able to explain each one.
- (d) Explain and demonstrate the posting of reliefs in interior guard duty.

(3) Military courtesy

- (a) State the general rules for saluting.
- (b) Demonstrate the correct way of reporting to an officer.
- (c) Explain military courtesies shown to officers.
- (d) Explain honors to the "National Anthem" and "To the Colors".
- (e) Know the title designation and insignia of rank of Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force Officers of the United States.
- (f) Explain in detail the manner and circumstances under which the Flag should be saluted.

(4) Uniform Regulations

- (b) Explain methods of preserving uniforms.
- (c) Pass a perfect uniform inspection, with all insignia properly worn.

(5) Rifle Marksmanship

- (a) know the nomenclature of the U.S. Rifle, Cal. 30.
- (b) Know individual safety precautions when firing weapons.
- (c) Demonstrate on the rifle-range correct methods of loading the rifle, Firing positions, trigger squeeze, and calling the shot.

(6) Hygiene and First Aid

- (a) Discuss the importance of health in the Armed Forces.
- (b) Describe methods for care of the body.
- (c) State the rules for avoiding disease.
- (d) Explain how you would stop bleeding.
- (e) Demonstrate how to protect a wound.
- (f) Explain how to prevent shock.
- (g) Explain first aid methods for burns and fractures.
- (h) Demonstrate and explain artificial respiration.

(7) Map Reading

- (a) Describe what a map is, and give reasons why we should learn to read maps.
- (b) Demonstrate ability to correctly measure distance on a map; to correctly indicate the directions NE, SE, SW, and NW, on a map, and correctly identify at least 10 conventional signs on a military map.

(8) Military Organization

- (a) Describe the organization of the rifle squad.
- (b) Describe the organization of the rifle platoon.

(9) Knowledge of the California Cadet Corps.

- (a) State the mission of the Corps.
- (b) Know the history of the Corps in the state of California and the history of the local unit.
- (c) Describe the distinctive insignia (crest) of the Corps, the collar ornament (wreath) of the Corps, and the insignia of rank for cadet officers.
- (d) know the names of the Adjutant General of the state of California, the Executive Officer, Assistant Executive Officer and Regional Supervisor
the Commandant and Assistant Commandants

(10) Recommendation

(a) Present a recommendation from both the platoon and company commanders that the candidate has participated satisfactorily in the work of the unit as an individual cadet.

3. Cadets who qualify under conditions of paragraph 2 above will be awarded the proficiency badge with basic bar by Cadet Corps Regional Supervisors.
4. Awards will be made during school year.

PROFICIENCY BADGE (INTERMEDIATE)

1. Proficiency badge with intermediate bar is awarded annually by the California Cadet Corps to Cadets who satisfactorily complete the prescribed requirements for this award.
2. To be eligible for this award, a cadet must;
 - a. Have satisfactorily completed the basic proficiency qualification tests.
 - b. Demonstrate mastery of the following requirements;
 - (1) Demonstrate ability to requalify for basic proficiency rating.
 - (2) Demonstrate ability to satisfactorily explain any movement of the school of the soldier and the manual of arms for the rifle.
 - (3) Demonstrate ability to give appropriate commands for drilling a squad.
 - (4) Demonstrate ability to function correctly as a non-commissioned officer of the guard.
 - (5) Serve in a satisfactory manner as a coach on the rifle range.
 - (6) Demonstrate ability to tie various types of bandages and to apply splints.
 - (7) Draw a rough sketch map of the community in which the school is located.
 - (8) Describe the organization of the rifle company.
 - (9) Demonstrate ability to pitch a shelter-half type tent with the assistance of another cadet. Explain the method of pitching the tent to the assistant.
 - (10) Discuss the basic elements of leadership in a military unit.
 - (11) Be able to correctly identify by proper nomenclature any part of the Springfield Rifle.
3. Cadets who qualify under provisions of paragraph 2 above will be awarded the proficiency intermediate bar by Cadet Corps Regional Supervisors.
4. Awards will be made during the school year.

PROFICIENCY BADGE (ADVANCED)

1. Proficiency badge with advanced bar is awarded annually by the California Cadet Corps to cadets who satisfactorily complete the requirements for this award.
2. To be eligible for this award a cadet must:
 - a. Have satisfactorily completed the basic proficiency qualification tests.
 - b. Have satisfactorily completed the intermediate proficiency qualification tests.
 - c. Demonstrate mastery of the following:
 - (1) Demonstrate ability to requalify for both the basic and the intermediate proficiency ratings.
 - (2) Be able to satisfactorily explain any drill movement capable of being performed by a rifle squad.
 - (3) Demonstrate ability to give appropriate commands for drilling a platoon.
 - (4) Demonstrate ability to function as commanding officer of the guard in interior guard duty.
 - (5) Demonstrate ability to act as range officer in rifle marksmanship program.
 - (6) Demonstrate two different ways to orient a map.
 - (7) Describe the organization of the rifle battalion.
 - (8) Explain the meaning of discipline among military personnel.
 - (9) Demonstrate a working knowledge of how the supply section of the unit is organized and how it functions.
 - (10) Prepare a military letter in the correct form for a military correspondence.
 - (11) Demonstrate ability to prepare a monthly roster and strength return for his unit.
 - (12) Prepare a plan for an overnight bivouac for the unit covering transportation, messing, sanitation, training program, guard, recreation, and method of housing.
3. Cadets who qualify under provisions of paragraph 2 above will be awarded the proficiency advanced bar by Cadet Corps Regional Supervisors.
4. Awards will be made during the school year.
